After joining FIFA in 1929, the new member achieved its first tournament victory twelve months later in the Far Eastern Games - a triumph that was to be repeated at various other events. The association has often excelled in the role of host. An exhaustive list of all of the tournaments would be impossible; suffice it to say that it has hosted all of the types of football recognised by FIFA. The Japan Football Association played an exemplary role in founding its own league (JSL) in 1965 that is still thriving today in a variety of forms. The Japanese association supervises 47 regional associations and coordinates their demands and needs. Having organised various FIFA competitions at world level, starting with the U-20 FIFA World Cup in 1979, reaching a climax with the 2002 FIFA World Cup Korea/Japan™, and including the FIFA Club World Cup that has been regularly held in Japan since 2005, the Japan Football Association is the most active FIFA member in this respect.

Goal Project

On 4 February 2008, the *Goal* Bureau gave the green light to a special project for the Japan Football Association, comprising the construction of a medical centre in the J-Village, the Japanese national football centre. All sports medical examinations are now coordinated from this centre and data concerning young players is compiled and analysed. Furthermore, measures to prevent football injuries will be devised here before being published. The centre was inaugurated in the presence of FIFA President Joseph S. Blatter on 14 September 2009.

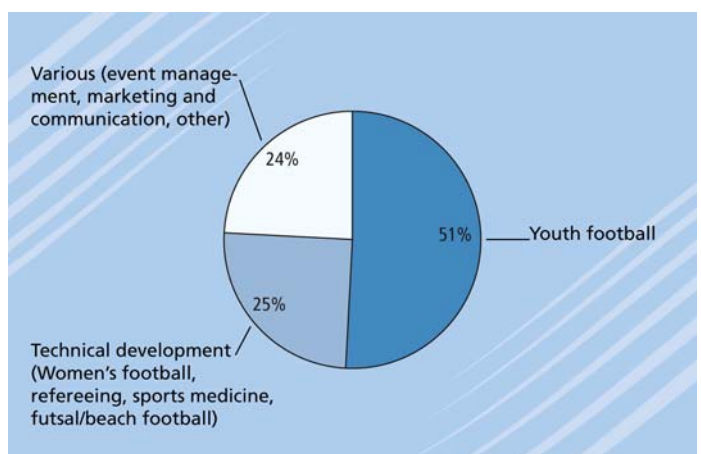

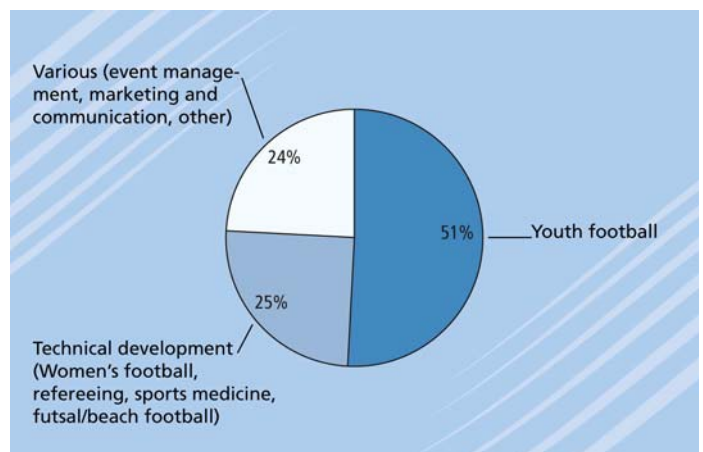

Women's football

When, in 1995, today's FIFA President said "The future of football is feminine", it was more than mere lip service. It reflected a strong belief in the huge potential that women's football has to develop. Ever since, FIFA has given targeted support for the efforts of associations who offer women the same opportunities to develop as male players. Launched in 1998, FIFA's Financial Assistance Programme (FAP) introduced a requirement in 2004 for the associations and confederations to invest at least 4% of their FAP funding into women's football. This threshold was increased to 10% in 2005. On top of this commitment, FIFA also promotes the women's game in more general ways by directly financing women's matches and organising competitions and symposiums. Thanks to its development programmes, FIFA is also playing an active role in the training of administrators, coaches, referees and sports doctors.
